## **Germ obsession can harm children**

PARENTS can damage their child's immune system because a majority think it's important to protect children from exposure to all bacteria, not realising that some exposure is crucial in developing a child's immune system.

Parents are obsessed with keeping them in a sterile bubble of antibacterial wipes, sprays and antibiotics.

Dr Bernard Mahon of the Institute of Immunology, Maynooth, says: "The marketing hype pushing total annihilation of bacteria indicates that there is real concern that we are misunderstanding bacteria and the vital role some bacteria can play in our overall health and wellbeing and the development during early years."

## **Plans for major store in Bantry**

DEVELOPERS applying to build a new store in Bantry, Co Cork say the plan would re-invigorate the town centre and create 150 full-time construction jobs and 100 local jobs after it is built, according to developers.

Richard Coffey and Donal Hunt, who have a contract with Tesco, will seek a material contravention of the Cork county development plan at a meeting tomorrow. They say the store will generate €3m a year in salaries.
